The Impact of Buyer-Supplier Relationships in the Security Sector

Buyer-supplier relationships can be complex. Research suggests that different types of relationships can have a dramatic impact on the success of the contract and the overall impact on client performance. Until now this has remained largely unexamined in the security sector.

This research will aim to identify the different types of buyer-supplier relationships; to examine the factors necessary to sustain a mutually beneficial relationship; and to explore the challenges involved in developing and sustaining effective buyer-supplier relationships. Factors to be considered:

- a) The element of trust and how it is manifested and undermined
- b) The role of communications, and what amounts to good and bad practice
- c) The relevance of co-operation
- d) The centrality of Know Your Buyer (and their other suppliers; and Know Your Supplier (and their other clients)
- e) The part played by finance and 'the deal'

What does it involve and what does it cost?

Companies sign up for three years. Each year we undertake a study that develops new insights into security practice. Full details of previous projects are on our website, they include tool-kits on strategy development and procurement, and reports on the value of security and the state of the security sector.

You can be involved as much or as little as you wish. There are two meetings a year at which the Perpetuity team provide feedback. You are invited to these. Some members attend these and interact in between; others take a more back seat role. It is up to you. In any event we provide regular updates on progress.

The cost is £2,500 plus VAT for companies up to 250 employees and £5,000 plus VAT for bigger companies. That is the only cost.
